

**REGULAR MEETING**  
**October 5, 2010**

The Ogden City Council met in Regular Session on Tuesday, October 5, 2010, at 7:00 p.m. in the City Hall Council Chambers. Mayor Keith Berg presided. Council members present were Sean Thompson, Lyle Conklin, Brian Reimers and Lori Anderson (arrived at 7:05 p.m.). Absent: Margaret Liston. Councilman Reimers noted an omission on the September 7, 2010 minutes. Under Goals Review Reimers had reported Paul Hagen was looking into extra property for the cemetery.

Councilman Conklin moved to approve the Regular Meeting minutes of September 7, 2010 with correction and the Special Meeting minutes of September 14, 2010. Councilman Thompson seconded. Approval was unanimous.

Sewer Superintendent Chad Thede reported that he finished hauling sludge last week and will be working on the lift station.

City Clerk Deb Vigdal addressed concerns with current software needing upgrading. Vigdal will research other software options. Vigdal also reported on a cemetery refund of \$150.00 for lots that were purchased, but not able to be used. Council agreed to refunding the \$150.00 or offering two other lots.

Councilman Conklin moved to approve a beer/liquor license for Clark’s Food Mart. Councilman Reimers seconded. Approval was unanimous.

Mayor Berg opened a public hearing at 7:38 p.m. the CDBG Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation Project. No written or oral comments were submitted. The public hearing was closed.

Scott Renaud with FOX engineering reported on the bid letting results. Three bids were opened September 29, 2010. Municipal Pipe Tool Co. bid of \$306,979.00, Institutorm Technologies USA, Inc. bid of \$381, 094.75 and Visu-Sewer, Inc. bid \$387, 612.75. Renaud had some concerns with pricing in one block that requires an open cut. Renaud would like to consult with the CDBG grant administrator.

Councilwoman Anderson moved to table passing **Resolution No. 346 “A RESOLUTION APPROVING AND CONFIRMING PLANS, SPECIFICATIONS AND FORM OF CONTRACT FOR THE SANITARY SEWER COLLECTION SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT PROJECT”** until more information is available. Councilman Conklin seconded. Approval was unanimous.

Councilman Conklin moved to table the building permit request by Kathryn Cross. Councilwoman Anderson seconded. Approval was unanimous.

Dan Wilson suggested looking at our building permits for variance requests. Tom Kieffer reported there had been only one other variance request in the last year. Deb Vigdal will research other building permits.

Councilman Conklin moved to approve the building permit for Doug Weir to build a garage at 601 W. Mulberry requiring a rear & side yard variances. Councilwoman Anderson seconded. Approval was unanimous.

Mayor Berg presented Ordinance No. 228 “**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF OGDEN, IOWA, 1996, BY AMENDING PROVISIONS PERTAINING TO MUNICIPAL INFRACTIONS**” for its second reading

**Be It Enacted** by the City Council of the City of Ogden, Iowa:

**SECTION 1. SECTION MODIFIED.** Section 3.04 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Ogden, Iowa, 1996, is repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

**3.04 CIVIL CITATIONS.** Any officer authorized by the City to enforce this Code of Ordinances may issue a civil citation to a person who commits a municipal infraction. A copy of the citation may be served by personal service as provided in Rule of Civil Procedure 1.305, by certified mail addressed to the defendant at defendant’s last known mailing address, return receipt requested, or by publication in the manner as provided in Rule of Civil Procedure 1.310 and subject to the conditions of Rule of Civil Procedure 1.311. A copy of the citation shall be retained by the issuing officer, and the original citation shall be sent to the Clerk of the District Court. The citation shall serve as notification that a civil offense has been committed and shall contain the following information:

*(Code of Iowa, Sec. 364.22[4])*

1. The name and address of the defendant.
2. The name or description of the infraction attested to by the officer issuing the citation.
3. The location and time of the infraction.
4. The amount of civil penalty to be assessed or the alternative relief sought, or both.
5. The manner, location, and time in which the penalty may be paid.
6. The time and place of court appearance.
7. The penalty for failure to appear in court.
8. The legal description of the affected real property, if applicable.

If the citation affects real property and charges a violation relating to the condition of the property, including a building code violation, a local housing regulation violation, a housing code violation, or a public health or safety violation, after filing the citation with the Clerk of the District Court, the City shall also file the citation in the office of the County Treasurer.

**SECTION 2. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE.** If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

**SECTION 3. WHEN EFFECTIVE.** This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

Councilman Reimers moved to approve Ordinance No. 228 for its second reading and waive the third reading. Councilman Thompson seconded. Approval was unanimous.

Mayor Berg presented Ordinance No. 229 “**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF OGDEN, IOWA, 1996, BY ADDING PROVISIONS PERTAINING TO PROVIDING FALSE IDENTIFICATION INFORMATION**” for its second reading

**Be It Enacted** by the City Council of the City of Ogden, Iowa:

**SECTION 1. SECTION ADDED.** The Code of Ordinances of the City of Ogden, Iowa, 1996, is amended by adding a new Section 41.12, entitled PROVIDING FALSE IDENTIFICATION INFORMATION, which is hereby adopted to read as follows:

**41.12 PROVIDING FALSE IDENTIFICATION INFORMATION.** No person shall knowingly provide false identification information to anyone known by the person to be a peace officer, emergency medical care provider, or firefighter, whether paid or volunteer, in the performance of any act that is within the scope of the lawful duty or authority of that officer, emergency medical care provider, or firefighter.

*(Code of Iowa, Sec. 719.1A)*

**SECTION 2. REPEALER.** All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE.** If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

**SECTION 4. WHEN EFFECTIVE.** This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

Councilman Conklin moved to approve Ordinance No. 229 for its second reading and waive the third reading. Councilwoman Anderson seconded. Approval was unanimous.

Mayor Berg presented Ordinance No. 230 “**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF OGDEN, IOWA, 1996, BY AMENDING PROVISIONS PERTAINING TO SIDEWALK STANDARDS**” for its second reading.

**Be It Enacted** by the City Council of the City of Ogden, Iowa:

**SECTION 1. SUBSECTION MODIFIED.** Subsection 11 of Section 136.08 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Ogden, Iowa, 1996, is repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

11. Curb Ramps and Sloped Areas for Persons with Disabilities. If a street, road, or highway is newly built or reconstructed, a curb ramp or sloped area shall be constructed or installed at each intersection of the street, road, or highway with a sidewalk or path. If a sidewalk or path is newly built or reconstructed, a curb ramp or sloped area shall be constructed or installed at each intersection of the sidewalk or path with a street,

highway, or road. Curb ramps and sloped areas that are required pursuant to this subsection shall be constructed or installed in compliance with applicable Federal requirements adopted in accordance with the Federal Americans with Disabilities Act, including (but not limited to) the guidelines issued by the Federal Architectural and Transportation Barriers Compliance Board.

*(Code of Iowa, Sec. 216C.9)*

**SECTION 2. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE.** If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

**SECTION 3. WHEN EFFECTIVE.** This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

**Be It Enacted** by the City Council of the City of Ogden, Iowa:

**SECTION 1. SECTION MODIFIED.** Section 62.01 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Ogden, Iowa, 1996, is repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

**62.01 VIOLATION OF REGULATIONS.** Any person who willfully fails or refuses to comply with any lawful order of a peace officer or direction of a Fire Department officer during a fire, or who fails to abide by the applicable provisions of the following Iowa statutory laws relating to motor vehicles and the statutory law of the road is in violation of this section. Under old business Paul Hagen informed the Council that he had spoken with Merlin Paulson about purchasing land for the cemetery. The purchase price would be \$20,000.00 an acre. The Council was not in support of this purchase.

Mayor Berg reported on the Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation meeting that was held October 4, 2010. A copy of this plan is available at the City Clerk's office for public review. Berg also discussed cutting the water service for the downtown demolition project. He expressed concerns if the street was cut if it would be able to be patched before winter. Council felt if it patching could be done within the next 30 days, we should proceed otherwise it would be best to wait until spring.

Under new business, Councilman Thompson offered to organize the basketball programs for this year. The Council was in support of his help so that the program could continue.
